

About Frank Rogers



Dr. Rogers is the Muriel Bernice Roberts Professor of Spiritual Formation and Narrative Pedagogy and the co-director of the Center for Engaged Compassion at the Claremont School of Theology. His research focuses on how compassion is cultivated—compassion that

is contemplatively grounded, personally empowering, and socially restorative. A trained spiritual director, therapeutic practitioner, and retreat leader, he has worked in North America, Zimbabwe, Great Britain, and Israel/Palestine.

Frank is the author of *Compassion in Practice: The Way of Jesus; Practicing Compassion; The Way of Radical Compassion—A Curriculum; The God of Shattered Glass, A Novel*, and *Finding God in the Graffiti: Empowering Teenagers through Stories*. Compassion books will be available for purchase on Friday evening.

THE WAY OF RADICAL COMPASSION

Jesus' Spiritual Path as an Invitation to Personal and Social Transformation

Jesus was a spiritual teacher. He taught a way of personal and social transformation rooted in a radical understanding of threefold compassion—1) becoming ever more rooted in an extravagantly compassionate God; 2) cultivating an alive love for ourselves; and 3) loving our neighbors as ourselves, extending an empowered compassion not only to those who suffer but to strangers, outcasts, even our enemies. In fact, Jesus's earliest followers were not called Christians, but 'Followers of the Way.' This evening presentation

describes this spiritual path of Jesus and explores its importance for our lives and our world.

THE WAY OF RADICAL COMPASSION:

Living Jesus' Spiritual Path in Our Lives and Communities

Jesus not only taught a way of personal and social transformation rooted in a radical understanding of compassion; he yearned for persons and communities to know its restorative promise. For him, compassion is the secret to freeing us from all the internal chaos within us that prevents us from being the grounded people of care and vitality we are deep inside. Compassion is the bond that restores relationships whether at home, in the workplace, or in the public square. This day-long workshop—through stories, contemplative practices, and reflection exercises—will offer an experiential introduction to the restorative power of compassion for our personal well-being and for sustaining our relationships.
